Now More Than Ever by Governor Tom Ganse

If one takes the time to read more critical and balanced trade publications, and looks past the mainstream media's sensationalism surroundina the current economic conditions, one could easily develop the opinion that we are experiencing a natural correction to the euphoric but unsustainable market conditions of the past decade or so. Some might even go so

far as to say this correction is similar to the one this country experienced in the 1930s following what became known as "the Roaring Twenties:" a decade so named because of the devil-may-care

disregard for economic fundamentals in favor of the get-mine-now lifestyle.

Whoops! Did I step on some toes with that comparison? The fact is, the Great Depression triggered many substantial financial reforms, as have the many minor recessions that occurred since then. Our economy is integrated into a broader global economy, and the conditions that led to the Great Depression have been thwarted. However, having said that, there is no doubt that the magnitude of this

correction is the most significant we've seen in a long time, and many of our citizens are ill-prepared to deal with it. Consequently, children caught in the challenges are suffering disproportionate consequences.

The media blames the challenging economic conditions for just about every woe we face anymore. Imagine my surprise to hear a Kiwanian argue that Kiwanis is losing members because of it. Folks, we have members amona our ranks that remember the Great Depression, and we have members among our ranks that understand the economics of then and now, and I'm willing to bet they will unanimously agree that conditions were far worse in the 1930s.

And yet Kiwanis membership grew throughout that decade. Why?

The answer is simple. Kiwanis

Local club response to economic challenges

Throughout our history, Kiwanis has always found a way to care for our members during difficult times. Many of our Kiwanis clubs and members have been impacted by the global financial crisis. Job losses, foreclosures, bankruptcies and other financial challenges place additional pressure on our members in both their professional and personal lives. During these difficult times, sensitivity to the individual needs of members should be a priority for club leaders. Following are some ideas that might jump start some thinking on how to respond in times like these:

1. Thank and praise club members for the difference they are making in the lives of others. During a time like this, members need to be reminded of how powerful their service in Kiwanis is, and how criti-

cally important their support is to those that are less fortunate

- 2. **Schedule** speakers and other meeting programming that gives members access to advice and ideas about personal finance, budgeting, career advice and cost-saving measures.
- 3. **Provide** individualized support for those members that are experiencing personal difficulties and encourage them to stay involved in Kiwanis.
- 4. Consider temporarily waiving the local dues of those members who are unemployed and explore other ways to reduce the financial burden of Kiwanis, i.e., reduce meetings to two times a month, meet in a venue that allows people bring their own food, etc.
- 5. **Develop** club satellite meeting opportunities for those that currently have to travel long distances to attend meetings.
- 6. Focus on fun and fellowship. While Kiwanis should always be a positive place where members can laugh and enjoy themselves, it is especially important during times like these. With bad news all around, Kiwanis should be a source of joy for our club members.
- 7. **Offer** formal and/or informal networking opportunities for those that might be experiencing a gap in their career.
- 8. **Support** people in the community who are struggling with the basics of food, shelter and clothing. In addition to pro-

viding a great service, this also provides members a measure of perspective that they really have much to be thankful for.

- 9. **Relieve** the pressure to donate or fundraise on those members that are struggling financially.
- 10. Invite new members into your club and reject the notion that we should just hunker down and ride out the storm. New members bring fresh ideas and energy. Imagine the pride of your members when your club emerges from this recession larger and stronger than ever!

Now more than ever. Take a hard look at your projects and the dramatically changing needs of your community. Do you really need that park now? Or would food and clothing for pantries and shelters be more meaningful? Is a \$1,000 scholarship for a sinale student important, or is it more important to buy \$1,000 worth of books that will touch the lives of hundreds of children. I don't know. It's your community. Go find out.

And remember, Kiwanis grew during the Great Depression. It can, should, and must grow now to meet the increasing strain on the children of our communities. People in Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia are looking for ways to lend a hand. Open the door and let them help us.

Key Leader is fastapproaching on March 27-29, in Millersville, Maryland, at Arlington Echo Outdoor Education Center. Every Kiwanis Club is being asked to sponsor at least 1-2 students to attend our event in March, and each club that does will receive a Key Leader banner patch!

To register, students must have a nominator or sponsor (does not have to be the same person/group). Visit http://key-leader.org/participate/ and


click "Register" next to the March 27-29 Arlington Echo listing – follow steps to register online.

The cost is \$150/ student for those in Key Club or Builders Club (thanks to KIF scholarships) or \$175/student for those not in the Kiwanis Family. Meals, lodging, t-shirt, participant manual and more are included in registration fee.

Key Leader is a leadership education weekend for high school students focusing on the concept of service leadership and five principles: integrity, growth, respect, community and excellence. The weekend is casual and includes handson exercises; writing and reflection activities; cooperative, team activities; physical challenges and more. Students arrive between 4-6 p.m. on Friday and depart between 11 a.m.-12 noon on Sunday. Key Leader was created by Kiwanis International in 2005. This is a program every Kiwanian can feel proud of.

I want to remind you also that in addition to groups or organizations or schools sponsoring students to attend Key Leader, any individual can neighbor, friend and so on. The only requirement is that the student is currently in 8th-12th grade. There is no limit to how many students can attend from the same school.

With right-minded Kiwanians like you, we will reach our goal of bringing 60 (or more!) students together for a life-changing weekend of leadership development, March 27-29! Key Leader is so valuable, but it can only be impacting if we work together to find stu-

Does a Pool Put You at Risk? by Mike Rind, Chair, Risk Management

A new law became effective on December 20, 2008, requiring owners of pools and spas used by the public to incorporate new safety features to help ensure that drains and suction outlets be covered in such a way as to prevent young children (and others) from drowning. Very specific requirements are imposed on anyone who owns or operates a public pool or spa. (See attached CPSC Guide to complying with the law).

In the October eBuilder, we alerted clubs that this law was about to become effective. There was little response, leading us to be-

lieve that few, if any, clubs in our District actually own pools used by the public. However, many clubs may work with local pools or Boys and Girls Clubs to give children an opportunity to swim during the hot summer months. Owners of all such pools or spas should be notified of this change, to ensure full compliance. To learn whether your public pool or spa complies, please review the attached summary of compliance requirements. Note that, if anyone has a pool that is not now open, you have until the pool is actually opened to ensure full compliance.

Kiwanis International has concluded that it is so important that these legal requirements be met that any accident that occurs when a Kiwanis Club or District owns or operates a pool that does not meet these standards will NOT be covered by the Kiwanis Policy of General Liability Insurance.
