Dear Governor Don,

With great sadness we have learned of the terrible tragedy that has befallen Haiti. The loss of human life is staggering. The suffering that will continue is beyond comprehension. Haiti is a member of our Kiwanis family with an active Kiwanis club (the Kiwanis Club of Jeremie) under the leadership of President David Latour. They need our help. You can help.

Our Kiwanis Foundation of Canada and our Kiwanis International Foundation have each committed \$10,000 to be used to match money donated by our clubs and our members. We are petitioning the Government of Canada to match our combined money and the indication is that they will. That means

that a \$100 individual donation will yield \$400 in Haitian aid. In order to make sure that our donations go to where they are most needed, we have partnered with UNICEF Canada. UNICEF already has field workers in Haiti providing much needed aid.

Don, we have set up a special Kiwanis web page, with UNICEF, that will allow them to track our Kiwanis donations and provide the necessary reports to our Foundations and to the Government of Canada. Registration Now Open For Spring 2010 Key Leader

Our spring 2010 weekend will be April 23-25, 2010, at Arlington Echo Outdoor Education Center, in Millersville, Maryland. Registration is NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE for this event. Please visit www.key-leader.org and click on Registration Information on the left side. Then find our event listing and click Register. Follow all prompts to register. Registration is complete only when a screen shows at the end that says something to the effect of 'Thank you for registering registration now complete.'

The date of the weekend is approximately one month after Key Club District Con-

vention and does not conflict with Passover, Easter, SATs, or local spring break weeks. Arlington Echo is the same location as the 2008 and 2009 spring Key Leader events and consists of 24 wooded acres on the Severn River and boasts heated cabins, a dining hall, an outdoor ropes course, and more. Arlington Echo is about 45 minutes from Washington, D.C., and about 20 minutes from Annapolis. Corey Goggin from the Kiwanis Club of Tysons Corner is our 2010 Arlington Echo site coordinator.

Kiwanis International has determined that the 2010 registration cost will be is \$200.00 per student if not in Key Club or Builders Club. The Kiwanis Club of Lynchburg, Virginia, celebrated its 90th year of community service at a Randolph College banquet hall with over one hundred attending. When we all think about service, what is needed, how to perform it

and how to promote the continuance of community service and our Sponsored Leadership Programs, one ingredient is to look to our Kiwanis history, our legacy.

The Lynchburg Kiwanis Club is the eighth oldest club in the Capital District having been founded January 15th, 1920. This was five years after Kiwanis itself was founded. It was two years after the end of The Great War. Autos and air travel were still in their in-

Important Club Insurance Issues by Mike Rind

Club Secretaries recently received new General Liability packages from Kiwanis International. They have also received information on two major developments regarding Kiwanis's Insurance offerings.

First, Clubs may now choose to purchase an OPTIONAL "Accident Insurance" package, including death, injury and disability benefits for members injured while working on Kiwanis projects. The cost to a club ranges from \$2.15 to \$3.50 per mem-

ber per year, depending on the level of coverage selected. In deciding whether to choose this option, clubs should consider whether it may duplicate

fancy. It was a time of the founding of the Washington club, Baltimore, Roanoke, Wilmington, and Petersburg among others. And today, new clubs and the oldest clubs continue to look to how to best serve the needs of their communities. The Lynchburg Kiwanis Club has the formulae and still does exactly that. In fact they will host the Capital District Convention in August 2010.

Past President Ed McCann, Lynchburg president in 1990, highlighted many service projects of the club over the years. For example in 1922, "the Club established its Education and Benevolent fund, the vehicle through which the Club financed its charitable work in the community. Later in the 1920's, the Club aided in the beautification of Riverside Park ... contributing to the City and planting 400 Kwansan Cherry Trees'. They constructed

Trees'. They constructed playgrounds, provided help to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the Community Chest, and public school programs with childhood immunization programs, tutoring, supporting area Key Clubs. Kiwanians con-



tribute to this Foundation.

The Key Note speaker was United States Army Colonel Gray Heppner, M.D., winner of the 2009 Kiwanis International World Service Award at the Nashville convention for his medical research on malaria. He is working on the development of a malaria vaccine and is in the Kiwanis spirit of "One Can Make A Difference". And as leaders in service, like COL Heppner and like so many Kiwanians, we can all inspire others to join us in changing the world. Now is the time. Congratulations, Lynchburg Kiwanians.

coverage their members may already have in their personal homeowners' coverage, and also the amount of strenuous activity in which club members engage in their service and fundraising activities.

Second, an issue which has been a source of question for some time has now been resolved. As of November, 2009, Kiwanis General Liability Coverage no longer excludes the sale of alcohol. There are a number of requirements associated with this change, which will be

discussed in detail during the upcoming District Midwinter Conference training session on risk management.
