Convention goers packaged 26,500 meals to support Stop Hunger Now. The final count kept rising during the day from the 16,000 anticipated meals, to 18,000... to 21,000... to the 26,500 when disappointed workers had to

stop because they ran out of bags and boxes to put the meals in. More than \$6,600 came in over the last nine months from individuals and Kiwanis Clubs around the district to enable this effort.

Ducky Derby Ticket sales solidly bolstered the Capital District Foundation's support of the Seven Pediatric Trauma Hospitals in the Capital District.

So little time and so much good ~ but then, that's Kiwanis.

And a special note of thanks to the wonderful staff of the Williamsburg Marriott Hotel who gave us a stirring example of what can be done when good people put their hearts into their work.

Next year's Capital District Convention will be August 24-26 in Reston, Virginia.

The Kiwanis Club of Suburban Frederick was founded in 1972. The club's newsletter, the "Chatter", was first published in October of 1974 and has been published monthly ever since. Thanks to Charter Member Ed Crawford, every single printed edition of the Chatter from 1974 through 2003 (when the club converted to an online version of the club newsletter) has been preserved.

Club member Dave Malonev recently undertook the task of scanning all 360 editions (over 1800 individual pages) into his computer and uploading them so that the entire series can now be viewed online in .pdf format.

"Past editions of our club newsletter document many heretofore forgotten activities, fundraisers, public services, awards, and personalities," said Maloney.
